New from the government...

English Baccalaureate ...

•New government recognition - how many students achieve grades A*-C in five core subjects (GCSEs) - Maths, English, two Science qualifications, a Foreign Language and either History or Geography. (NB: Computer Science can be one of the two sciences)

•Not compulsory combination / Not appropriate for some students

•Government pushing this curriculum combination - want to ensure as many students as appropriate study traditional / academic curriculum

Why choose an e-Bacc curriculum ?

- •If you have the academic potential to succeed
- •If you enjoy those subjects anyway
- •Academic progression beyond looked on favourably (University etc)

At Unity ...

- •Ensure entitlement / access to e-Bacc

Guiding Rules for Choosing


- Consider where you are heading (if you know) apprenticeship, college, university, work

A Parent and Student Guide to Option Preferences

Every student at Unity College will study core GCSE courses in English, Maths and Science as well as courses in PE, iD and ICT. (some students will study a BTEC core Science pathway rather than a GCSE)

In addition to these core subjects, students are able to make choices about other subjects they will study in Years 9, 10 and 11. Not all students will study the same amount of optional subjects. The amount of courses that students follow will also depend on the combination and nature of their choices. Once all the options preferences have been processed, every student will receive a letter informing them of which courses they have been allocated to.

When making preferences for Key Stage 4 courses, students need to consider the following:

1. There are numerous courses on offer. This site gives guidance about the different subjects that we may be able to offer. Students are to select seven subjects in order of preference from the list on offer. Students will NOT be studying all seven of their preferences. Students will study a maximum of <u>five</u> of their seven preferences. At this point we cannot guarantee that these courses will run but we try to give all students as many of their preferred choices as possible.

2. There are various vocational courses on offer. These courses have the equivalence of <u>1 GCSE</u> in that subject. You can only choose to study a maximum of TWO vocational courses (not including core ICT). The vocational courses on offer are:

BTEC Dance NVQ Level 2 Sport

NB: Some students will study a vocational BTEC core Science course which will count as one of their two vocational courses. All students will follow a vocational ICT core course - this does not take up one of their two vocational choices.


YEAR 8 extra information ...

As Year 8 move in to Year 9 and begin their KS4 courses over three years, we are able to deliver GCSE PE to those who choose it within core PE time. This means that GCSE PE is able to be an extra qualification for those students without it taking up one of their other options choices. If you wish to study GCSE PE you should choose it in the normal way as one of your 7 preferences.

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

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Frequently Asked Questions about Year 9 Options.

Q. What are BTEC diplomas?

The BTEC First is a Level 2 qualification that can be delivered at KS4.

BTEC qualifications are designed to provide specialist work-related qualifications in a range of sectors. They have been developed to provide the knowledge, understanding and skills necessary to prepare learners for employment and/or to provide career development opportunities for those already in work. Consequently they provide a course of study for fulltime or part-time learners in schools, colleges and training centres.

On successful completion of a BTEC First qualification, learners may progress into or within employment and/or continue their study in the vocational area.

BTEC First Diploma

The Edexcel Level 2 BTEC First Diploma is a 360 guided learning hour qualification comprising core and specialist units which cover aspects of knowledge, understanding and competency necessary for employment within the sector.

BTEC First Certificate

The Edexcel Level 2 BTEC First Certificate is a 180 guided learning hour qualification which offers a bite-sized opportunity for learners to experience a vocational qualification.

Q. Are BTEC diplomas for less academic students?

BTEC Diplomas are NOT for less academic students, they are still Level 2 courses just with a vocational element to the course.


Both the First Diploma and First Certificate have GCSE equivalence. The Diploma is worth 4 higher GCSE grades, the Certificate is worth 2 higher GCSE grades. There is no written examination, both courses are 100% coursework.

Q. Will Universities and employers accept BTEC diplomas?

Colleges will accept BTEC Diplomas and Certificates. Students wishing to progress to Level 3 qualifications such as BTEC Nationals will need a Merit overall in the Diploma.

Employers accept BTEC as they have been specially designed to cover aspects of knowledge, understanding and competency necessary for employment within the sector.

Studying Drama to GCSE level:

Drama GCSE involves mainly practical work with a small element of written coursework.


It is suitable for anyone who has enjoyed the subject in the lower years and wishes to continue to study Drama to exam level.

Through improvisation and the performing of plays you will explore themes, issues and ideas. You will experiment with a wide variety of Drama skills and activities and have the opportunity to see performances and explore technical skills such as lighting.

The final examination is in three parts. The first two exams are very similar to class lessons and allow you to demonstrate your skills and understanding through a series of workshop style tasks. The final examination is a performance, either devised or scripted and you will work in small groups over a number of weeks as preparation for this. You could achieve an A*- G grade if you followed this course.

Personal Qualities required to study GCSE Drama:

To study Drama you must be a confident and enthusiastic performer. You must have an open mind and be willing to learn. It is very important that you are a good listener and always willing to have a go. Attendance to lessons is an important factor too.

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In this example, you can see the various subjects listed in the table. 
